This is a winter term appointment for the period January 1st, 2026, to April 30th, 2026, with classes in session from January 5th, 2026, to April 6th, 2026 (followed by the final assessment period).

Course Description:

KNPE 493 Special Topics in Kinesiology – Topic: Settler Colonialism and Sport / Units: 3.0

Intensive coverage of advanced topics that are current and/or of special interest in Kinesiology. The topic Settler Colonialism and Sport will examine how sport in Canada is shaped by settler colonialism. Students will explore how sport has operated as a tool of dispossession, assimilation, and nation-building, and how Indigenous communities utilize sport as a platform for resistance, resurgence, and cultural continuity.

Learning Hours: 120 (36 Seminar, 84 Private Study) Course Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Critically analyze issues related to a special topic in the multidisciplinary field of Kinesiology.
- 2. Discuss scholarly publications related to the special topic.
- 3. Apply different theoretical approaches to studying the special topic.
- 4. Practice advanced oral and written communication skills.
