This course will provide you with a broad understanding of the major social determinants of health in Canada and globally today, including income, the economy, and work; poverty; racism and social exclusion; colonialism and Indigeneity; access to food and shelter; child development and education; climate change and the environment; and war and migration. You will also learn about interventions, or actions, that individuals and governments can take to address the social determinants of health.

Course Learning Hours: 117 (18 lecture; 24 online; 75 personal)

Instructor Contact Hours: Instructor delivers the same 1.5 hr lecture each week to two different sections of students.

Course Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Recognize, define, and apply key concepts in public and population health
- 2. Critically analyze the social determinants of health in Canadian and global contexts
- 3. Identify policies and other interventions addressing the social determinants of health
- 4. Apply course concepts in the analysis of current health issues
